High praise for safety makeover in Newark

A MAJOR project to boost safety in Newark has moved full steam ahead with hundreds of thousands of pounds invested into new technology and security to fight crime.

The Safer Streets programme, led by Nottinghamshire Police and Crime Commissioner Paddy Tipping, is turning the tables on burglars and thieves thanks to the installation of upgraded security and sophisticated crime-fighting tools in the Northgate and Chatham areas of the town.

The project, which is being delivered by a host of partners including Nottinghamshire Police, Newark and Sherwood District Council, Nottinghamshire County Council and the PCC, has already brought almost 300 new LED lights to the area as part of a £150,000 streetlight upgrade.

The installation of new state-of-theart automatic number plate recognition (ANPR) cameras in the town has already provided more than 500,000 readings in relation to offences such as criminal damage, thefts and burglary - and are being used within Nottinghamshire Police, including Operation Reacher and the intelligence department to crackdown on crime.

Nottinghamshire Police is also delivering an extra 90 hours' of police patrols per month to boost visibility and dozens of residents have received free security upgrades — including solar-powered 4G



cameras - to reduce their vulnerability to crime.

In addition, cyclists are benefitting from free GPS cycle trackers, worth more than £100 each, and free security marking to protect their bikes from future theft.

Meanwhile, work has started on transforming a former council flat in Chatham Court into a new community hub, where locals will be able to access face-to-face contact for policing enquiries, housing services and other council support.

The new facility, which will include a computer area for residents, is part of a plan to build resilience within the community and support people to overcome any issues affecting their

lives. It compliments work to expand Neighbourhood Watch in the area and encourage people to sign up to the force's Neighbourhood Alert service.

Nottinghamshire has been noted nationally for its innovative Safer Streets model, which aims to increase crime detection capability in the town as well as prevent offences happening in the first place.

Paddy Tipping, who was among the project leads welcoming the Minister of State for Policing and Crime, Kit Malthouse, to Newark, said: "The Safer Streets team has really hit the ground running to improve life and safety in Newark and already a huge amount of investment has been poured into stepping up protection in the Chatham and Northgate areas.

"The feedback we have received has been overwhelmingly positive and local people really appreciate the efforts of all the partners in banishing criminals from Newark.

"While the health crisis has undoubtedly had an impact, I'm really impressed with the tenacity of the team and the readiness to overcome obstacles to deliver these improvements for the benefit of local

Run London Marathon and help our hospice

SIX runners have the chance to take part in this year's Virgin Money London Marathon and help Beaumond House Hospice Care too.

The charity has been given one place in the 2021 London event and five places in the virtual race, both of which will be held on October 3.

Now people are being invited to apply to claim the places.

Ashleigh Haggar, of Fernwood, completed the London Marathon in 2016 and raised more than £2,000 for Beaumond House.

He said he had tried unsuccessfully a couple of times to get a place in the marathon and when he heard Beaumond House had one he decided to apply.

"It seemed to make sense to run in the marathon and raise money for Beaumond House as well," Ashleigh said.

He spent five months training and although it was hard at times he was determined to ensure he was well prepared.

Colleagues at Ambitions Personnel, where he is a senior accounts manager, sponsored him along with family, friends and people who heard what he was doing through a Facebook post.

"Once I put it out that I was doing the London Marathon and that I was running for Beaumond House I had a great response," Ashleigh said. "It was amazing how generous people were and how many people wanted to help."

On the day he said the hardest part for him was seeing a sign saying they had completed 20 miles and that there was only another 10k to go

"I think that was meant to inspire you but at that stage 10k was still a long way," he said.

"But I knew I was running for all those people who had supported me and that helped keep me going."

Individual fundraising manager **Kat Wright** said she was thrilled the hospice has successfully acquired places.

The hospice has set a fundraising target of $\pounds 3,000$ for the London event and $\pounds 300$ for the virtual race.

The hospice is offering a marathon package with a personalised runner's top, fundraising support, a training survival kit, and a sports massage donated by Ian Jenkinson from Back To Life Clinic.

WORK on the main building at the YMCA Newark and Sherwood community and activity village started in February.

It followed the official signing of a contract by RG Carter Construction and the young people and families charity for the village's main building, on Lord Hawke Way, Newark.

Todd Cauthorn, executive director for YMCA Newark and Sherwood, said: "It feels good to be working with a local business in RG Carter on such a largescale project that will create jobs, youth apprenticeships and transformational life opportunities in addition to strengthening the already fantastic community spirit in Newark.

"We have worked closely with partners from a wide range of services as well as local authorities to ensure there are programmes that help people belong, contribute and thrive.

When the pandemic began early last year, we were concerned about the potential impact on the village ... we are pleased that developments are moving ahead.

"Provided everything goes to plan considering the current circumstances, this progress indicates that our main building hopefully will be completed in spring 2022.

Jason Wilson, senior project manager at R G Carter, said: "It's great to be able to provide the local community with a new



purpose-built environment, which matches their vision for the very best services and support for young people to help them reach their full potential."

Whilst the village has been closed during parts of the pandemic, continuous investment has still been a top priority for YMCA Newark and Sherwood.

Notable progress was made during the first lockdown, including the launch of the outdoor Multi-Use Games Area (MUGA) and having one of the 3G community pitches professionally recrumbed ahead of reopening.

Coun David Lloyd, leader of Newark and Sherwood District Council, added: "To say we're excited to see this phase of the





YMCA project coming forward would be an understatement. It's more than a building.

"This development will house those many activities which will engage with local people of all ages but specifically those sometimes referred to as 'hard to reach'.

The positive impact for communities that arise from the programmes run from this facility will be inestimable.

'It's that piece in the jigsaw that makes the picture complete - state-of-the-art sports provision, sites for local sporting teams to practice and play, engaging younger people and families in a wide range of activities and learning.





More free help to tackle crime in Newark hotspots

BIKE thieves are being warned they are more likely than ever to be caught as residents are being given another chance to claim free tracking devices.

GPS trackers, worth more than £100 each, are being given to people in Newark to put the brakes on criminals looking to steal bikes.

The expansion of the scheme to prevent bike thefts and improve community safety follows an increase in funding.

Following extensive trials on their efficiency, high-quality GPS cycle trackers have been bought as part of the Safer Streets project, led by Nottinghamshire Police and Crime Commissioner (PCC) Paddy Tipping to crackdown on burglary, vehicle crime and cycle theft.

The PCC secured funding from the Home Office's Safer Streets Fund in July 2020 and is working closely with Newark and Sherwood District Council, Nottinghamshire Police and Nottinghamshire County Council to improve the lives of people living in the

Chatham Court and Northgate areas of the town.

Recipients do not necessarily need to live in Newark but should regularly travel into and around Newark by bicycle (under normal, non-Covid circumstances). Alternatively, recipients should live within the Chatham Court area or Northgate area (including Tithe Barn Court, Queens Court and Lovers Lane).

Bikes should have cost at least £250 when bought within the last three years.

Owners will need access to a smart phone to track the device.

Extra weight will be given to those who have been a victim of cycle theft.

To apply, residents should contact the Safer Streets Team at Newark and Sherwood District Council by emailing community.safety@nsdc.info who will inform them if they have been successful.

Trackers consist of a small, lightweight accessory linked to a smartphone app.

safety plan near school

NEW safety measures are being proposed for the B6326 in a bid to address road safety concerns around Suthers School in Fernwood.

Nottinghamshire County Council has put together a package of measures to lower traffic speeds and advise motorists of the presence of children crossing on the approaches to the school.

These include the installation of a new vehicle-activated speed sign on the approach to the Tawny Owl roundabout over the A1 and additional 40mph repeater speed signs.

Warning signs will also be placed in each direction near the crossing and on the approaches to Tawny Owl crossing point, alerting drivers to the presence of school pupils crossing the road.

Coun John Cottee, chairman of Communities and Place Committee at Nottinghamshire County Council, said: "Road safety is a high priority and we've listened to concerns from the parish council, school head teacher and residents and hope that this combination of safety measures will be welcomed.

"Further work is also under way to review the layout of the current crossing facilities at the Tawny Owl roundabout.'

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Powering up for electric vehicles

MORE drivers in Newark and Sherwood will be able to power up their electric vehicles in council car parks, after a national grant has enabled eight new chargepoints to be installed.

Newark and Sherwood District Council has been awarded £51,000 from the Government's On-Street Residential Chargepoint Scheme.

Local authorities were invited to submit applications for the scheme to increase the availability of charging points in residential streets, built-up areas and town centre car parks to help prepare and support for the transition towards zero emission vehicles.

While the fund is primarily designed for the installation of chargepoints in built-up areas with on-street parking, in areas such as Newark where there is little on-street parking, funding can be used by councils to install chargepoints in town centre car parks.

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As well as the seven chargepoints already in place at district council car parks in Newark, the additional facilities are being installed as part of the move toward greener transport, helping to improve air quality in the quest to cut back on fossil fuels.

Due to be installed before the end of April, four new chargepoints will be put in the council's car park on London Road, Newark, as well as four at Southwell Town Council's Bramley Centre car park.

Coun Roger Jackson, chairman of the Leisure and Environment Committee at Newark and Sherwood District Council, said: "Electric vehicles are becoming more and more popular and we want to do all we can to enable our residents to use them by making charging points available.

"As part of our Climate Emergency Strategy, we installed seven rapid charge points in December 2019 in three of the district council's car parks — four at Riverside, one at Appletongate and two at Castle House in Newark. Providing electric car charging points is a vital part of our aim to promote greener transport solutions and make the district cleaner, safer and greener.

"The new chargepoints are a hugely positive step in helping us be at the



forefront of low and zero emission vehicle use, delivering cleaner air for the district."


At the moment 'fastcharging' chargepoints can be found at Riverside car park, Newark, and can power up most vehicles in three hours while the 'ultracharge' one at Appletongate provides up to 80 per cent power within 30 minutes.

Additional 'fastcharging' facilties are also in place at the Castle House car park, although this is temporarily out of use because the site is currently being used for a Covid-19 testing venue.

Customers access the equipment through a smart card or mobile app.

Car parking charges will apply between 8am and 6pm but local residents will be able to take advantage of chargepoints from 6pm and 8am without incurring parking charges.





RESIDENTS and visitors to Newark are being invited to have their say on the town's cultural activities and how best to promote and celebrate its history and heritage.

As part of Newark's High Street Heritage Action Zone (HSHAZ) project, which is being funded by Historic England, a three-year cultural programme has been developed, titled Newark Creates.

Newark and Sherwood District Council and Inspire, the lead project partner, have opened a public consultation to understand more about Newark's residents and visitors, what cultural activities they already engage with and what town centre experiences they would like to see on offer.

The cultural programme will be built and led by Newark's Cultural Consortium, which is made up of local organisations including Inspire, Newark Civic Trust, Newark Heritage Trust, Newark Book Festival, Newark and Sherwood CVS and Newark and Sherwood College (Schools of Violin, Piano and Woodwind).

Newark Conservation Area was granted £275,000 from Historic England to restore and unlock its heritage potential and the initiative will breathe new life into town centres by revitalising old buildings and regenerate a vibrant place for locals, businesses and visitors.

Leader **Coun David Lloyd** said: "It's been a challenging year for everyone, and our apprentices have tackled any obstacles head on and have achieved great things.

"It was great last week to see the stories of just some of our apprentices shared publicly on our social media, with many having gone on to permanent roles with us."

Grounds maintenance apprentices Callum Scrimshaw and Oliver Wilson have both secured full time positions due to additional workload and contracts being secured by the Street Scene team. Callum said: "It's been great to meet new

PLANS to lay wildflower seeds on Nottinghamshire's grass verges, incvluding in Southwell, have moved a step closer.

Nottinghamshire County Council highways partner Via East Midlands has so far planted more than 160 new trees along some of the county's roadsides with plans for the same again this year.

Sites have also been earmarked for the planting of wildflowers to help attract wildlife to the grass verges and improve the overall environment.

Sites identified include:

The A6097 East Bridgford junction.

The A608 verges at Sherwood Business Park. Mansfield.

Corkhill Lane, Southwell.

The council's Communities and Place Committee has also heard about plans to

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work with Defra to plant 2.1m trees at the former Rufford Colliery site in Rainworth as part of the government's Nature for Climate Fund project to provide a community forest in Nottinghamshire and boost woodland areas across England.

Coun John Cottee, chairman of the Communities and Place Committee, said: "Reviewing our policy around how we manage the cutting of grass verges is a really important step to improve biodiversity, wildlife and encouraging wild flowers to grow. It's also worth stressing the importance of ensuring this work fits with our road safety criteria too.

"Tm encouraged with the work proposed in the development of grass verges which have been identified with support from the Wildlife Trust and local councils where we will be undertaking works to promote wildflowers.

"This year our partner's Via East Midlands have planted 160 new trees alongside the county's roadsides and in the next year are looking to plant another 150. These trees will have a positive impact



on our communities, not only providing environmental benefits, but also bringing the beauty of nature to our streets.

"We are also undertaking work with Defra as part of our green estate strategy and their Trees for Climate programme, which will see 2.1 million trees planted in Rufford Colliery and also Bentinck South, near Kirkby.

"These steps are taking us in the right direction to providing a better local environment for future Nottinghamshire residents."

Coun Cottee added: "At the county council's policy committee in March 2020 the council's Corporate Environment Strategy was agreed and the environmental work we've discussed fits with our ambitious aspirations."





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Environmental Action Day 'success' at Newark estate

AN extensive range of activities, including litter picking, street sweeping and tree planting, to make an area of Newark Cleaner, Safer and Greener has been described as a fantastic success.

Staff from Newark and Sherwood District Council undertook environmental work at an action day at the Chatham Court estate, Newark, tackling physical issues that could encourage further crime in an area.

Extensive evidence suggests that visible signs of disorder — such as anti-social graffiti, fly-tipping and litter — can lead to and encourage further criminal activity in a community.

Enhancing the look and feel of an area by tackling seemingly minor issues, helps communicate pride and expectations of the community, while helping prevent issues from escalating into more significant problems.

The programme is part of the Safer Streets project, a crime fighting and safety improvement initiative, led by Nottinghamshire Police and Crime Commissioner (PCC) Paddy Tipping.

The project is a partnership between the PCC, Nottinghamshire Police, Newark and Sherwood District Council and Nottinghamshire County Council to improve security in two areas particularly affected by crimes such as burglary, vehicle theft and robbery — the Chatham Court and Northgate areas of Newark.

As well as litter picking, three mattresses and two divan beds were taken off the Chatham Court estate, while bin storage areas were swept and pressure washed, with any debris removed.

Eight new trees - four oak and four goat





willow — were planted around Chatham Court, while hedges were trimmed, grass was cut, weeds removed and play areas cleaned.

The door entry systems at Chatham Court are also being upgraded as part of the Safer Streets project. A new video entry system is being installed within all flat blocks, replacing the previous intercom system, to improve security in communal areas.

Magnetic locking mechanisms are being upgraded as a further preventative measure against crime. Improvement works to the inside of flat blocks are also taking place in corridors and stairways, including repainting, improved interior lighting and new hard-wearing vinyl floor.

Since the launch of the Safer Streets campaign in September 2020, considerable progress has been made in reducing crime and increasing public safety. More than 100 street lights have been upgraded in both the Chatham Court and Northgate areas, from older sodium lanterns to new LED bulbs which emit white light with improved colour rendering.

On-street cycle stores are being upgraded to more secure designs and work is underway for new, top of the range, cycle 'pods' for bike owners to take advantage of.

Newark and Sherwood District Council leader **Coun David Lloyd** said: "The day has been a fantastic success. One of our aims as part of the Safer Streets project is to deter crime from happening in the first place and tackling environmental concerns is more significant in doing that than people may realise.

"An area with visible signs of disorder can, and does, lead to further crime being committed in the same area. We want to instill a sense of pride and help residents to feel proud and safe. A great deal has been achieved, not just today, but since the start of the project and feedback we are receiving from residents has been overwhelmingly positive."

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

Teenager's unique role as a CSI apprentice with police

PICTURE the scene: There's been a stabbing inside a house in a sleepy suburban street.

Officers are in attendance and have arrested two people in connection with the report — a victim is in hospital with serious injuries and an investigation has been launched to identify who committed the crime.

DNA samples and evidence are scattered throughout the property and Nottinghamshire Police's Crime Scene Investigation Unit is tasked with gathering and photographing items crucial to finding who the correct suspect is.

At just 18-years-old, **Louis Clark**, of Southwell, is part of this vital team.

In what is thought to be among the first opportunities of its kind in the country, Louis has just completed his first week as a CSI apprentice at the force.

Working as part of a busy team working on some of the most serious cases in the county, he admits that he still has to pinch himself when he thinks about his new job.

"I have always been fascinated with forensics," explained Louis. "I finished my A-levels in biology, geography and business and managed to secure a week's work experience in the CSI team at Nottinghamshire Police.

"From that point on I knew that policing



was a route that I wanted to go down. I had such a positive experience and was made to feel so welcome by the team. I have to pinch myself when I say my job is in CSI."

Crime scene investigators roles involve securing and protecting crime scenes in order to collect and categorise evidence such as weapons, fingerprints, clothing and other biological evidence that could aid officers and detectives in investigations.

Experienced **Crime Scene Investigator Leigh Richards** said: "Louis is a superstar. Despite his age, he expertly demonstrated his passion, communications skills and talent to us and we were delighted that he agreed to join the team at Nottinghamshire Police," she explained.

"Louis will be studying a photography apprenticeship alongside being trained as a Tier 1 Crime Scene Investigator — an industry recognised qualification that will enable him to work on lower level investigations.

"His photography apprenticeship will also be incredibly useful. Photos play a massive part in our evidence gathering process and being able to take good-quality images in the right way is a vital skill."

Chief Constable Craig Guildford, pictured with Louis, added: "As a force, we are always looking for new talent and innovative ways to enable people from all ages and backgrounds to enjoy a career in policing."
